

EBCU Manifesto



CAMRA is today celebrating the publication of the European Beer Consumers Union Manifesto, which calls upon the EU to preserve and promote Europe's beer and brewing

heritage, support Europe's well-run pubs and bars and protect European beer consumers' rights!

CAMRA will be writing to European election candidates asking them to endorse this manifesto.

The European Beer Consumers Union (EBCU) was formed in Bruges in May 1990, and is now a federation of 13 European beer consumer organisations. EBCU currently has a combined membership of over 120,000 members, with the common aim of representing the interests and views of beer consumers across Europe. Beer is the national drink of many member states in the EU, with beer being brewed in Europe for many thousands of years.

Mike Benner, CAMRA Chief Executive, speaking at the release of the publication, said: 'In the UK, responsible pub-goers have been penalised by a 20% increase in beer duty since the start of 2008, therefore CAMRA wholeheartedly backs EBCU's idea of lower excise duty on beer sold in pubs.' Benner continued: 'Beer is a product that generates billions of euros and pounds each year in tax revenue, and the beer and

brewing industry's value to the European economy is truly significant- the industry contributes a staggering 57.5 billion euros annually!'

Other points contained in the manifesto include an equal treatment for beer in relation to wine, and raising the awareness of beer as a natural agricultural product. One of the objectives looks to emphasise the need for greater parity in relation to financial support for malting barley and hop growers compared to their wine industry equivalent. The manifesto also stresses the need for the EU to review its strategy on reducing alcohol-related harm.

Benner concluded: 'There needs to be a greater awareness that the responsible consumption of alcohol in well-run, licensed premises reduces the risk of alcohol misuse, and subsequent social disorder. What this ground-breaking manifesto re-iterates in a similar fashion to past CAMRA campaigns is that beer is inextricably linked with our past, and we should be proud of our rich European brewing heritage.'

European brewing facts and figures:

- Beer has been brewed in Europe for over 3,000 years
- Number of breweries in Europe is over 3.000
- EU brewers produce 416m hectolitres of beer annually
- -The beer and brewing industry contributes 57,500,000,000 euros to the European Economy annually
- Member states receive at least 39,000,000,000 euros a year in tax revenues
- 50% of the world's hops are produced in Europe

Pub history - Miners Arms

Few people living in the Dronfield area these days would ever dream that the area had a mining past. In fact over the years around 40 coal mines are known to have existed in the Dronfield and Unstone area. For further details of these mines, see the excellent web resource run by A. N. Bridgewater at http://myweb.tiscali.co.uk/colliery.

Two of these mines used to be found at Dronfield Woodhouse and Hundall and they provided trade for and directly influenced the names of their respective nearby pubs – both called the Miner's Arms and this article briefly outlines their history.

Miner's Arms, Dronfield Woodhouse

Dronfield Woodhouse mine was located on Carr Lane, near the Miner's Arms. There was a further mine at Stubley, near the Dronfield School Gosforth site, and local sources also state that there was another mine opposite the top of Carr Lane, which had opened in 1795.

A beerhouse at 'Woodhouse' was first recorded in an 1833 Trade Directory, run by William Hattersley. As an aside, the Peacock at Owler Bar was also run by a William Hattersley in 1833, and it is possible that they were the same person.

By 1857, Hattersley was listed as running a public house, known as the Miner's Arms. The assumption is that the current pub started life in the early 1830s as a simple beerhouse. Census records reveal that William Hattersley was born around 1795 and that his son, Henry, subsequently ran the pub in the 1890s. Sheffield brewer Duncan

Gilmour & Co. bought the Miner's in 1919 from another Sheffield brewer, Old Albion, which also supplied the Red Lion in Dronfield. Gilmour's themselves were bought by Tetleys in 1954. The Miner's is now owned by the Punch Taverns pub company and beer brewed in Sheffield, from Kelham Island Brewery, may still be enjoyed at this popular community local today.

Miner's Arms, Hundall

Hundall mine is believed to have opened in the 1870s – it is not possible to be more exact than this due to a lack of documentary evidence. Located up a track opposite the Miner's Arms, it was operated by the Hundall Colliery Co. until its short life ended in 1887 when the mining equipment was sold off.

The pub premises were originally a farmhouse/homestead belonging to the Stephenson family. A beerhouse was opened sometime after the Stephenson's sold the property in 1858 and the first evidence of its existence is the 1871 census when the licensee was Joseph Breedon, who was also a coal miner. Previous owners include several breweries - Thomas Berry (from Sheffield) and then Tennant Brothers', via their takeover of the former in August 1924, and finally Whitbread (see below).

Comparing the various dates above, it appears that the beerhouse opened before the mine, especially as beerhouse licences were generally not issued after 1869, and it may not initially have carried the 'Miner's Arms' name.

The beerhouse licence was converted to a full pub licence in the early 1950s whilst the landlord and landlady between 1971 & 1978 – Jim and Jean Hardy – are fondly remembered in Mick McDermott's book 'Ghostly Exhumations', which is available from Dronfield Library.

Jim and Jean left in 1978 after Whitbread, who had merged with Tennant Brothers' in 1961-2, decided to sell the pub at auction after the couple had decided not to purchase it themselves. The pub is still open and remains a traditional community local.

Ballot papers have been sent out to the 1050 CAMRA members in Sheffield & District branch, which takes in all of the city of Sheffield along with parts of Derbyshire including Dronfield and the Hope Valley, to decide the winners of the branch Pub of the Year competition.

Two winners are declared, one in the South Yorkshire part of the branch which then gets submitted into the Yorkshire County competition for judging and one in the Derbyshire part of the branch which then gets submitted into the Derbyshire County competition for judging. The county competitions are the early rounds of the national Pub of the Year competition, which was last year won by the Kelham Island Tayern in Sheffield.

The votes are now in and have been counted, and we are pleased to announce the results.



The 2009 Sheffield winner is once again the Kelham Island Tavern. This pub has proved a continuing favourite amongst city real ale drinkers, having won several years in a row now!

When landlord Trevor Wraith bought this pub, it was closed down, boarded up and pretty much written off by it's previous



owners. Trevor's magic formula of high standards, good staff, excellent beer range, value for money and a lovely tropical beer garden has proved popular. It wasn't long before an extension needed to be built to cope, and that is now filled with drinkers at busy times!

National Club of the Year 2009

Thriving Yorkshire club wins CAMRA national accolade

Guiseley Factory Workers Club, a working men's club renowned for its outstanding beer quality and choice, has been announced as CAMRA's National Club of the Year for 2009.

Situated in the town of Guiseley, West Yorkshire, the club previously won the CAMRA Leeds Pub of the Year in 2006, and is a regular in the CAMRA Good Beer Guide. CAMRA judges noted how the club has consistently maintained a large range of quality real ales thanks to a dedicated beer selection panel on the club's managing committee.

The traditional three-roomed layout of the club consists of a lounge, snooker room and concert room, and has become a meeting place for community clubs and societies. The club holds an annual beer festival in April, and maintains a strong relationship with local brewers; this consideration for the local economy being another reason why judges were so impressed by the club.

Since 2003, when the club began serving real ale, the management has dealt with over 142 different breweries, subsequently serving a staggering 627 different real ales from their 4 guest ale handpumps!

On hearing the news of the club's success, Paul Kennedy, Guiseley Factory Workers Club Secretary, said:

'We are surprised to win, but it's a tremendous reward for the efforts of the

people involved in the club, with our very own beer committee selecting a successful range of beer that appeals to our drinkers. Our stewards are fantastically devoted cellar men- good beer is simple to serve if you do the right things, and we at the club are all dedicated to maintaining high standards.'

There are currently around 30,000 clubs in the UK. For the search to find CAMRA's National Club of the Year, submissions were put forward by CAMRA's 200-plus local branches, with the criteria based around the club's commitment to real ale. In 2009, the Yorkshire-based working men's club reigned supreme over the three other National finalists, which were-

- United Services Club, Egham, Surrey
- Leyton Orient Supporters Club, London (Also, joint National winner, 2008)
- Somers Sports and Social Club, Halesowen, West Midlands

'Guiseley Factory Workers Club is a deserved winner as it is a perfect venue for the discerning real ale drinker, as well as anyone wishing to enjoy the ambience and relaxed surroundings of a great club. Consistently excellent service and great value for money, there is also a wide range of events held to cater for the surrounding community. What more could you ask for in your local club?!'

Community pubs 'vital social role'

MPs have been presented with a new report which highlights the importance of pubs to society and calls for urgent action to avert the closure of 40 pubs a week. The report was produced by leading think tank, ippr, Institute for Public Policy Research, with the support of CAMRA, the Campaign for Real Ale.

The ippr report includes a pioneering new method of calculating the social and economic benefit generated by well-run community pubs and finds that pubs are:

- the most popular place where people can mix socially with others from different backgrounds
- a great supporter of charity, with over £3,000 raised per pub every year
- outside of the home the most popular place for people to meet their neighbours
 a place for people to make new friendsmore than one in five pub goers has made
 a new friend in a pub in the past six months.

Rick Muir, Senior Research Fellow, ippr said: 'Government must stop using a one size fits all approach to licensed premises which is killing off our community pubs. Well-run community pubs should be encouraged and supported rather than penalised along with the small number of badly run pubs. Community pubs are not just places to drink but also places where people meet their neighbours; make new friends; and where local clubs hold meetings and events.'

'At a time of unprecedented pub closures, this report will help Local Councils and National Government recognise the importance of well-run pubs to strong communities and thriving local economies.

Well-run community pubs not only provide a safe and relaxed environment for people to enjoy a drink but they also form the bedrock of community life and people's social networks. Virtual networking sites such as Facebook and My Space will never be able to replace the experience of socialising in person in the Great British Pub.'

Budget response beer tax rise means more misery

Mike Benner, CAMRA Chief Executive, said "It is disappointing that the Chancellor has ignored widespread public concern about the plight of Britain's pubs and decided to press ahead with an increase which will result in yet more valued community pubs closing down. Well-run community pubs are already struggling as a result of last year's 18% increase in beer duty and the recession. This further beer duty increase will push more valued pubs over the edge resulting in job losses, reduced Government tax revenue and many more deprived of their favourite local pub."

"Well-run pubs provide an enjoyable and affordable night out in a safe and supervised environment and this duty increase will simply fuel irresponsible drinking of cheap discount alcohol in people's homes, public parks and on the streets."
