DOROTHY PAX

Live music venue, real ale bar, canal-side drinking spot, home of the Pax Cat, and a unique Sheffield institution - the Dorothy Pax was all of these things. However, it has now closed down. The shock announcement at the beginning of March followed a series of gig cancellations due to poor ticket sales.

Statement from the Dorothy Pax:

"We are heartbroken to announce that The Dorothy Pax is now closed with immediate effect.

It's not been an easy decision to make as this affects not only ourselves but the bar staff, the engineers, the artists, our local boating community, our wider Sheffield community, and our suppliers.

We've had some amazing parties, produced several festivals, hosted countless world-class talent on our stage, laughed, cried, shared incredible evenings, made lifelong friends, and boogied the night away.

However, we cannot continue to do so. I don't want to point fingers, but we've had our fair share of battles, and we've always come out the other side, but we've got too many wounds to lick now to continue.

It's not very pleasant to be a statistic at any time, and we're certainly upset about being added to the number of grassroots music venues that have closed down over the last few years through difficulties thrown at the industry. including Covid-19, rising bills, and our customers facing a cost-of-livina crisis.

The grassroots music industry is facing an uphill battle. As a whole, we're all trying to make this work on a profit margin of 0.48%, whilst those at the top are reporting billions in profits. If £1 per ticket at stadium shows, arena gigs, and large festivals went back to us collectively, we wouldn't have to subsidise ourselves hugely to carry on doing the work we do.

But we have. We've footed that bill internally, mainly because we love it and understand its importance to our wellbeing, community, and cultural output. We know we do good work. Nothing is quite like the high you get when you see a full room of people dancing, enjoying each other's company, whilst the musicians on stage are performing their hearts out with smiles across their faces. Nothing will ever come close to that feeling.

If it wasn't for the support of the Music Venue Trust, this announcement would have come five years ago. They've not only had our side, but they've tirelessly worked so hard in supporting 900+ of our colleagues within the grassroots music industry.

Please believe us that we have exhausted every possible avenue over the last year or so to keep on going, but the time has come.

Continue to support your grassroots music venues, your local pub, and independent businesses because now is the time that they need you the most. Use them, or lose them.

So, thank you all for the best eight years."







INN BRIEF

Sheffield Beer Week saw the wooden pin make another appearance at **Hop Hideout** (pictured left) in Leah's Yard, Sheffield City Centre, providing a cask ale option. This time, the beer from the wood was Abbeydale *Moonshine*.

By the time this issue of **BEER MATTERS** hits the streets, the **Mount Pleasant** in Norton Lees should have reopened under new management.

Clubhouse on London Road has announced that they won't be renewing their lease and are likely to close in March. In a statement, they described it as a heartbreaking decision but acknowledged that times are tough, bills are becoming extortionate, and they simply can't continue. The Steel City derby match was unusually not screened there, as their direct debit to Sky Sports had already been cancelled ahead of the closure – it was costing them £3,000 a month!

Two of the Dronfield town centre pubs taking part in the One Valley Festival on 7 June have announced their plans. **Manor House Hotel** will be following a similar format to last year, with the car park closed off and two outdoor bars – one featuring cask ale from Abbeydale Brewery, along with Pellizco's Mexican food trailer. Live music will be provided by The Britpop Rockers at 4pm and 6pm, followed by DJ Brad Gee, who will keep the party going from 7:30pm until late

Meanwhile, down the road at **Green Dragon**, they are also sticking to a tried-and-tested formula, with the car park closed off and live music performed from the back of a wagon. DJ Higz will be playing tunes between and after the bands, and a fish & chip trailer will keep everyone fed. Two outdoor bars will supplement the main pub bar, offering real ales, shots, and bottled drinks outside.

Cross Scythes in Totley has now reopened under new management following refurbishment and is offering "elevated pub dining."



Congratulations to Garry and the team at the Rising Sun (471 Fulwood Road, S10 3QA), winners of the Sheffield & District CAMRA Sheffield (West) Pub of the Year 2025.

Owned by Sheffield Beerworks EOT Ltd., the Employee-Owned Trust that also includes Abbeydale Brewery, the Rising Sun has been an Abbeydale community pub and dining room since 19 December 2005, when the brewery took over from the University of Sheffield Union of Students. The Union had run the building for just over 23 years. Previous management includes the Sheffield & District Public House Trust Co. Ltd. and John Smith's Tadcaster Brewery.

The original pub opened around 1860. The name refers to pubs that face east and receive early morning sunlight, as did the earlier Rising Sun. The current pub was built when the Sheffield Town Trustees gareed to provide land for the widening of Fulwood Road in exchange for the demolition and reconstruction of the original building. The new pub opened in July 1904, and Abbeydale carried out an extensive refurbishment in 2014.

Inside, there are two comfortably furnished rooms with a log-burning fire between the main bar and the glass-roofed extension. The large beer garden includes covered, heated areas, and the pub is child- and dog-friendly. A quiz night is held on Sunday evenings.

In 1914, the Sheffield and Rotherham Red Book and Almanac (p.407) stated that "many pleasure seekers find this suburban house very convenient for the supply of general refreshments." Today, not much has changed - the Rising Sun offers 13 cask beers, including a large Abbeydale range, alongside rotating quest specials across both cask and keg. There is also an ever-changing cider selection, a carefully curated wine list, a large range of quality spirits, and plenty of non-alcoholic options. In addition, the creative, seasonal food menu showcases the best of British produce, with the pub working closely with a range of local suppliers.

OLD HALL HOTEL Hope

The "District" part of the Sheffield & District branch covers the Derbyshire area, including Killamarsh, Ridgeway, and a large section of the Peak District National Park, primarily the Hope Valley, extending as far as Millers Dale and Edale. As with the Yorkshire pubs in Sheffield, a panel of judges visits the top two pubs from the members' vote to select an overall winner. That winner then advances to the North Derbyshire entry round of the national competition.

For 2025, our District Pub of the Year is the Old Hall Hotel in Hope. The venue combines a pub. restaurant, tea room, and bed & breakfast accommodation, with the bar offering a range of cask ales and an extensive selection of Scotch single malt whiskies.

Our festival secretary, Jess Cawley, reports on his visit

"Located in the Hope Valley, the Old Hall public house sits in the picturesque village of Hope. nestled below Lose Hill, which marks one end of the famous Lose Hill ridge. The first mention of the current building dates back to a rebuilding in 1703, forming what is now the Old Hall pub, which became a listed building in 1984.

Inside, the pub has a traditional feel, with oakpaneled walls creating a welcoming and convivial atmosphere. My lunchtime meal was French onion soup and a beef sandwich, both of which went down well. There were half a dozen real ales to choose from, including the well-known Theakston's Old Peculier. My Theakston's Best was very palatable.

The pub also runs a beer festival on bank holidays and is popular with both tourists and locals. Facilities were excellent, and the extensive menu was reasonably priced."



ABBEYDALE BREWERY

Due for release from Abbeydale Brewery this month, Dr Morton's Rogue Apostrophe (4.1%) is back to irritate the grammatically minded amongst us. An easy drinking pale with Pacific Gem and Azacca hop's, combining to give flavours of tropical fruit's and berrys. Joining it on bars throughout April is Through the Hopback - Cascade, a 3.9% pale ale and a hop we can't quite believe we haven't showcased in this series before! Citrussy grapefruit in abundance on the aroma, with a gentle spicy character and a smooth bitterness.

Fen Violet is the first in a new cask only range for us, with artwork inspired by vintage botanical prints and lithographs. This one will be a 4.3% pale ale with Vic Secret and Columbus hops. We're expecting lovely aromatic qualities in this one, with gentle herbal notes of marjoram in the background and some fruity tropical flavours up front.

And from our Brewers Emporium we have a couple of exciting new specials on the way too. Cherry Bakewell Stout (5.0%) is a new special in our Salvation series, featuring the enticing combination of ripe, juicy cherry and flavours of frangipane. And from our single-hopped Obsession series, look out for Citra NEIPA (6.5%). A rockstar of the hop world, Citra is famed for an intensely citrussy character. Expect a potent, zesty aroma and a lip-smacking lemony flavour, smooth and fruity with a juicy finish.




DUALITY BREW CO.

Duality Brewery has recently relocated to Sheffield. Registered by Ben and Brendan in Todwick in March 2024 after winning a homebrew competition, the duo is now producing their beers in a unit located on Percy Street in Neepsend, next door to Alder Bar.

Many of their beers are styles where hops dominate, such as a New England IPA; however, they've also been known to produce other beers and recently showcased their range in Sheffield by hosting a brewery bar at the Neepsend Craft Beer Festival.

At the moment, Duality continues to be a parttime operation, with Ben and Brendan working a day job during the week and brewing on Saturdays. However, with them making a name for themselves quite quickly, who knows how that may change in the future!

With a heavy heart, we made the tough decision to stop milk production and focus entirely on our growing brewery. As the saying goes, we've never looked back!

Fast forward 20 years, and we're now brewing over 100,000 pints of beer each week! With a dedicated team of 25 at the brewery and another 20 at our brewery pubs, the beers keep flowing - fresh from grain to glass.

Our farming roots remain a huge part of our identity, and we love celebrating this through our beers. Farmers Blonde, which became our flagship ale, was named after the Blonde d'Aquitaine breed of cow, and many of our other beers follow the same theme.

While we embrace new trends and innovations, our brand is all about keeping cherished traditions alive - meeting friends at the pub. pint in hand, and having a natter. Our session ales are the perfect companion for these moments - a true taste of tradition.

From all of us at Bradfield Brewery, a heartfelt thank you to everyone - our suppliers, our hardworking team, and, of course. our loval customers near and far. Your support means the world to us. Cheers to the next 20 years!

We've got some exciting things in store to celebrate our 20th anniversary. First, we're paying homage to our very first brew, Farmers Bitter, with a brand-new creation - Farmers XX Best This new 4.6% ABV beer for Bradfield Brewery has been brewed with Maris Otter, amber, and chocolate malts. giving a full-bodied and complex mouthfeel, complemented by a robust bitterness and dark fruit flavours from the hops. Available in cask and 330ml bottles from the end of March, this new brew is just the beginning of more exciting things to come in 2025!



As is now traditional. Sheffield Beer Week marked the Brewery of St Mars of the Desert's tap room coming out its winter hibernation and it is now open most Fridays and Saturdays, 2pm to 8pm. It is now bar service and card payment only, it continues to be dog friendly. The brewery is just a few minutes walk from the main road through Attercliffe, served by buses 9/9a, 52/52a, 207 and X3

As part of Sheffield Beer Week. the Kelham Island Tavern showcased a number of new beers from Blue Bee Brewery. These included a coffee mild, french oak aged red ale and charred oak aged export stout as well as the usual hoppy pales that Blue Bee are more commonly known for!



Bradfield Brewery have released a special edition of their cask Farmers Stout with the stronger ABV of 8.4%.

Fuggle Bunny Brew House is introducing a monthly Saturday tap session in addition to the weekly Friday bar opening. The programme of "Fugale Saturdays" kick off on Easter Saturday then take place on the last Saturday of each month from 31 May to 29 November with the bar in the brewery open 3pm to 9pm and live music at 5pm. They also plan to host a food trader at Saturday events.

Our annual Hillsborough Social took place on Friday 21 February at the **Pangolin** on Middlewood Road. After meeting an old St Luke's friend in town, I arrived to find a healthy dozen or so drinkers ready to explore the delights the district has to offer.

My first drink of the evening was Brid's Cross, a brewery I wasn't familiar with. I opted for Ash and Elm. a 4.5% pale ale with piney. malty notes - a very pleasant American Pale Ale

Next, we took a short hop over the tram tracks to the excellent little micropub, the Beekeeper. This bar always has three hand pumps, one usually featuring a new Neepsend brew. I went for Muisca, a 5.5% American IPA.

Heading towards Hillsborough Corner, we popped into Northern Monkey, where they are making an effort to stock two cask ales. One of these was the Doctor Morton's Duck Baffler, a simple American pale ale of 4.1% for easy quaffing.



Across the traffic lights sits the Hillsborough Tap, always lively and with five cask pumps. Unfortunately, they had the SWFC match on, and it wasn't going well... so after a quick half, we made our way to the Rawson Spring.

This Wetherspoon pub, housed in the old swimming baths, still retains the spectator gallery as a visible feature. There's always a good selection of guest ales at great prices - especially with a CAMRA voucher. Mine was a pale ale, although, being later in the night, I forgot to note it.

Finally, to conclude the evening, we decamped to the Beer House S6. This larger ale bar boasts five cask lines, a cider on hand pump, and four or five kea options. There always seems to be something from Two by Two or Big Trip, so you're in safe hands when choosing a pint.

So, another successful social with a great turnout supporting this thriving beer community.



A recent birthday celebration saw a few days in Berlin. Travel was via Ryanair from Manchester: a full plane including a very well-behaved school party. The S9 S-Bahn then took us to our base at the Premier Inn Alexanderplatz. This central location allowed us to walk to most of the key sites, the exercise providing the excuse for the occasional rest-stop.

Bars visited included **Brauhaus** Georgbrau (Spreeufer 4, 10178). Established in 1992, this large

riverside old-style brewery and bar provided traditional favourites. Helles and Dunkel (both 5%).

Close by, Weihenstephaner Berlin (Neue Promenade 5. Hackescher Markt), the main Berlin outlet of the Bayarian State Brewery of Weihenstephan (Bayerische Staatsbrauerei Weihenstephan), provided a full range of German-style beers, all served by waiters wearing lederhosen. The Tradition Bayerlisch Dunkel (5.2%) was sampled. Established in 1040 and owned by the Free State

of Bavaria, this brewery claims to be the oldest in the world.

Our favourite outlet was Brauerei Lemke Berlin (founded 1999). under the railway arches at Hackeschen Markt. Here, Die Bierprobe provided six 0.1 L tasters: Bohemia Pilsner (5.0%), Original (5.4%), Weizen (5.5%), 030 Pale (5.0%), India Pale Ale (6.5%) and Budike Weisse (3.4%). The Budike had a gentle sourness while the IPA was sound to the style. These were the best beers tasted during our short stay.









Other beers encountered included Berliner Pranke echt mild bier (6%), a pale lager from the local Berliner-Kindl-Schultheiss-Brauerei and Stark-Bier (7.5%), a doppelbock from Störtebeker Braumanufaktur (1827), based in Stralsund, on the Baltic Sea. This brewery is named after Klaus, a late 14th-century pirate, who was executed in 1401.

We also visited many other well-known spots, including the Brandenburg Gate, Checkpoint Charlie, the Holocaust Memorial, Potsdam, Neue Nationalgalerie and Tiergarten.

In short, an excellent break, lots of culture and some interesting beers!

THREE B'S MICROPUB

Three B's Micropub was established in Bridlington in 2020.

Since opening, it has won many awards both from CAMRA and other bodies.


Following on from its success, the pub is moving to a new site within Bridlington this spring.

The new location is 2, Wellington Road, YO15 2BG, will feature five handpulls (up from four at the current site), plus craft keg taps and a large beer fridge.

The biggest asset the new pub will have is a large beer garden with seating for around 50 people at maximum

It is hoped the new location will be open by around the end of April. In the meantime, it will continue to trade at its current location on Marshall Avenue.

Stockport was once described by Friedrich Engels as "the duskiest. smokiest hole." However, when I arrived at the station, it was bathed in sunshine and was a few degrees warmer than the Sheffield I had left 40 minutes earlier. Having no romantic interest on the day, I consoled myself with beer.

The town has a history of hatting but was also one of the first centres of the Industrial Revolution, with the Rivers Goyt and Tame merging to form the Mersey for transportation.

Walking down into town, my first establishment was the White Lion on Gt Underbank, a nice ornate pub serving three cask ales. Mine was a Weetwood Cheshire Cat, a blonde/golden 4%.

On exiting, I tackled the short, steep cobbled hill to the Market Place,

a 12th-century feature, which contains the Angel Inn. A small bar selling three cask ales, of which the Beartown Best Bitter (3.7% session strength) was partaken, as I had not tried this one before. It was here I met Stephen Oakes and his Cockapoo, Boo, who was very friendly and recommended a few establishments, some of which were on my GBG list.

Armed with this info, I set off up the town and over a colourful bridge to reach the Petersgate Tap, a micro bar busy with locals. The bar has capacity for six cask ales, and I had the Horwich-based Blackedge Blonde at 4.5%, followed by a Small World Beers Barncliffe Bitter, again sessionable at 3.7%.

I was OK for time and decided on the longer walk towards the A6 Manchester Road to the Magnet on



Wellington Rd. This pub is atop the incline and is overshadowed by the railway's arches. Inside is a treasure trove of cask and keg, displayed on a TV screen. I had my first stout of the day, Riverhead's Winter Stout, a lovely dark-roast brew, thinner than usual but a reasonable 4.8%. Enjoying this pub, I twisted my own arm to have a Mallinsons Nectaron, a pleasant 4.1% pale.

A walk back down to the town's Frenchaate Centre saw me at the Swan With Two Necks, a Robinsons pub on Princes St selling Unicorn, a 4.2% bitter which is pleasantly hopped. I had a great conversation with an older couple who had similar tastes in music and who travelled Europe extensively on their motorcycle.





It was time to climb the cobbled hill again to Bakers Vaults in Market Place, a spacious venue with a good choice of cask. Among these was the Staggerinaly Good Forward to the Past, an American IPA, a tasty 5.2%. With around 75 minutes remaining. I made the walk back towards the station to Ye Olde Vic, a very traditional pub with an old-school charm. It boasted three or four ales, and I plumped for the 4Ts SPA at 3.8%.

A short hop up and down to the station saw a prompt train return me to Sheffield, with time for a couple of halves (a Derby Rheingold, 3.8%. and a Prime Pacific, 4.2%) in the Two & Six Micropub to end the eniovable day.


