

Heart of Dungworth at risk

Many of you will recall that the Royal closed last year. A planning application has now been lodged with Sheffield City Council to convert the pub into residential accommodation (ref. 25/00501/FUL). We have formally objected: the permanent loss of this culturally significant and historic pub would have a profound and detrimental impact on the local community and beyond.

The Royal Hotel (S6 6HF) has served as a vital community hub since 1813, providing a space for social interaction. local traditions and live music. Most notably, it is one of the key venues for the Sheffield Christmas Carols – a centuriesold folk tradition that draws visitors from across the country and further afield. Losing the pub would diminish this deeply rooted cultural event, which has been widely recognised as a unique and important part of British heritage.

The Royal attracts visitors not only from Sheffield but from further afield. The area has a growing, affluent customer base who regularly visit the surrounding countryside for recreation. Dungworth is criss-crossed with walking trails and sits on the edge of the Peak District National Park – the pub is a welcome sight for walkers seeking rest and refreshment. Locally, the past two years have seen nearly 20 new houses either built or granted planning.

There is strong evidence to suggest that, with the right management, the Royal could thrive. Many similar rural pubs in the Sheffield area are successfully attracting a mix of local patrons and visitors. The Royal's setting – with its historical significance and sweeping views across the Loxley Valley – offers a clear opportunity for revitalisation.

A key requirement for changeof-use applications involving pubs is a demonstrable effort to market the premises as a going concern. In this case, there is little evidence that the Royal has been properly offered for sale as a functioning pub. In contrast, a local fundraising initiative has already pledged a six-figure sum to support the future of the Royal, and a local brewery has expressed interest in purchasing the pub. Viable options clearly exist to avoid the unnecessary loss of a valued local facility — one that supports community cohesion, social interaction, and the local economy.

Given the strong interest in preserving the Royal, granting permission for its conversion at this stage would be premature. We believe the proposed development is inconsistent with both local and national policies on the conversion of pubs. With overwhelming community support and positive indicators from the Public House Viability Test. we urge the council to reject the application and support efforts to secure the future of the Royal Hotel as a sustainable business and vital community asset.

THE BEAR

While attending the Bear's beer and cheese event during Sheffield Beer Week, owner Matt pointed out an overly large pump clip on the wall, saying 'you know what that means'. I did – but I wasn't sure how he intended to serve it. The Bear has no cask lines.

Founded in 2021 by Matt Beety, the Bear is a cosy bottle shop at the top of Abbeydale Road, specialising primarily in craft beer. It boasts a wall of fridges and a bar with six keg lines. The Bear holds regular meet the brewer events, and the clip Matt pointed out was for Weekend Project's appearance in mid-March.

This was the Bear's first foray into cask (though its sister bar, the Old Shoe, has two lines), and the first issue to overcome was the complete absence of any serving mechanism for cask beer.

Matt brought in local company SR Beer Co to help set up a temporary handpull at the end of the bar, and relied on a bucket and some ice to keep the nine-gal-Ion cask cool.

The event was attended by Will from Weekend Project, along with sausage dog Oliver and seven of their beers – and, of course, about 25 drinkers. First up, and star of the show, was Planet Caravan on the new pump, ably poured by Sooty (with some help from his friend Jonny).

It was an evening full of tales from breweries both foreign and domestic – and guite a lot of beer.

The Bear has a steady stream of meet the brewer events advertised on its social media platforms, which tend to sell out quickly – and perhaps we can hope that future editions might feature some cask offerings too.



ANGLERS REST **REOPENS**

The Anglers has been communityowned since 2013, but this year has seen a change in approach, with the decision to lease the pub to a local business rather than continue running it in-house. The new operator is Peak Hospitality. headed by Rick Ellison, whose Atlantik Inns runs the Old Hall Hotel in Hope, the Peak Hotel in Castleton, and the Anchor in Tideswell. among others. The Anglers is now managed by Claire and Tom.

The pub has recently undergone a refurbishment, including a revamped bar area, a couple of cosy drinkers' spaces, the addition of a pool table, and a separate rustic dining room. The building also continues to house a post office, shop, and café – the latter soon to be transformed into the Tricky Trout Tea Room.

The bar features six handpumps, offering cask beers from Theakston, Eyam and Intrepid, alongside a rotating local guest. It's open from midday every day except Monday, closing at 10pm on Sundays and 11pm the rest of the week, Tom, an experienced chef with a strong reputation, runs the kitchen, serving meals in the pub's restaurant at lunchtimes and in the evenings Monday to Saturday, as well as Sunday afternoons.

The tea room is open daily from 8am to 4pm, serving breakfasts in the morning and a menu of sandwiches, soup and other light bites, with more substantial options available from lunchtime onwards.

The pub has its own car park, with the 257 bus passing the front door. Bamford railway station - served by the 272 bus - is about a 15-minute walk away.

Things are still being tweaked as the new team beds in - check their Facebook page for the latest updates.

2025 OVERALL AND KELHAM ISLAND/NEEPSEND



KELHAM ISLAND TAVERN

Russell Street

Our overall 2025 Pub of the Year – and also Kelham Island & Neepsend Area Pub of the Year - is the outstanding Kelham Island Tayern. The Kelham Island area has become a Sheffield beer destination in its own right, easily accessible from the city centre by bus and tram.

Constructed in the 1830s as part of a terrace, the building originally operated as The Sawmaker, later becoming The White Hart, and in 1995, The Kelham Island Tayern, It closed in 1999, and the derelict building was purchased

and reopened in March 2002. with a focus on real ale.

Over the last 22 years, the pub has gone from strength to strength. Since 2019, under the management of Josh and Louise, it has continued to offer a wide range of both cask and craft beers - always including a stout, porter, and a selection of IPAs and bitters. The beer range is consistently excellent, always featuring at least one from local brewery Blue Bee. The pub also boasts an excellent rear beer garden and maintains the standards to which many others aspire.

A simple snack menu is available, including pork pies.

Kelham Island Tayern was the first pub to be named CAMRA National Pub of the Year two vears running (2008 & 2009), and has been CAMRA Yorkshire Pub of the Year five times. It has also taken the title of Sheffield Pub of the Year on 18 occasions – a record that's unlikely ever to be overtaken.

EAST SHEFFIELD



The Oxbow Micropub opened its doors in January 2020, taking over what was once a kitchen showroom. It was founded by a group of friends who had long dreamed of running their own pub.

Despite the challenges of the pandemic, they successfully navigated those early years and are now open every day - thanks in no small part to a brilliant team who help make the Oxbow such a welcomina place to enjoy a drink.

The Oxbow offers a relaxed and friendly environment where everyone is welcome. It features three cask lines and seven keg lines (often including a cider), along with a varied selection of bottled and canned beers and ciders. The beer is sourced from both local breweries and further afield, ensuring there's something to suit every taste.

The interior is cosy, and there's also an outdoor seating area. The canopy roof was damaged during the storm in early 2025 but is due to be repaired soon. Please note the pub is a cashless venue.

There are regular tap takeovers and specialist beer events, alongside visiting food vans and a pub quiz every other Wednesday.

The pub is easy to reach via Stagecoach bus 52 or First bus X5, both of which stop nearby. If you're travelling on the 52, do allow a bit of extra time as the pub is at the very end of the route.

BATH HOTEL Victoria Street

A careful restoration of the original Ind Coope 1930s interior gave this two roomed pub a conservation award in 2002 and acknowledgement by CAMRA as one of Britain's pubs with a three star pub interior of exceptional national historic importance. The bar lies between the tiled lounge, a small corridor drinking area and the cosy well-upholstered snug. The owners, Brian and Ruth Johnson, have been on the Sheffield pub scene for many years – although not

SOUTH SHEFFIELD



The winner of this year's Sheffield South Pub of the Year award is the Brothers Arms. based in Heeley. Originally known as Ye Olde Shakespeare Inn – a name still visible in embossed letters on the front of the pub – it was taken over in 2014 by five members of local ukulele legends The Everly Pregnant Brothers. Eleven years on, it's still run by the same group, with Richard Bailes taking on the role of manager.

Alongside a great range of well-kept real ales, the judging panel particularly appreciated the strong community focus. Regular quiz nights, live

music, and art events cater to a wide variety of interests and provide a welcomina meetina point for local residents. You'll even spot a few prints on the walls by local artist - and one of the original five "Brothers" Pete McKee.

Visitors from further afield are also encouraged, with the Brothers Arms forming part of the emerging "Heeley Trian-



ale" alongside the Sheaf View and White Lion. The three pubs are starting to promote themselves collectively – and we can confirm it's a cracking real ale crawl.

As a nod to the pub's long history, some new artwork is set to go up soon. This includes old photos of the pub and a list of landlords going back 200 years, each one paired with the monarch reigning during their time. Originally compiled by the Fox family, who ran the pub through the 1950s and '60s, the list has been updated and reprinted ready to take pride of place on the wall.

ABBEYDALE BREWERY

First up this month we've got Nuggle (4.2%), a balanced and easy-drinking pale ale, featuring the UK grown hop combo of Nugget and Fugale! UK hops have come a long way and we reckon they deserve a moment in the spotlight. This one's from our Mythical Creatures series and is inspired by a magical miniature water horse from Shetland folklore.

And trust we'll be releasing **Dr Morton's Fake** News (4.1%) - a 100% reliable pale ale, featuring juicy Idaho 7 hops balanced by delicately resinous and earthy Savinjski Goldings. Plus we've got Through the Hopback - Chinook on the way (4.0%). A vibrant pale ale single hopped with bold and bright Chinook hops. Fruity, piney and spicy all in one, with a clean bitterness in the finish.

Lastly on the cask only side of things we're really looking forward to hosting a collaboration with superstars Roosters Brewing Co. Heading into Harrogate will be a 4.6% West Coast style pale, with predominantly Centennial hops.

And from the Brewers Emporium we've got a couple of tasty treats too – New Zealand hopped pale ale Ōkārito (4.5%) makes a welcome return, and we've got a new addition to our Unbeliever series in the form of a 4.7% Manao Sour. A throwback to the first EVER sour we made here, it's packed with succulent mango, backed up by bold and fruity Galaxy hops. Sweet, tart and tropical.

EMPLOYER OF THE YEAR

Sheffield based Abbevdale Brewery has been named the Employer of the Year by the Society of Independent Brewers & Associates (SIBA). This accolade celebrates the pioneering transition of the business to becoming 100% employee owned in 2024, recognising the commitment made by founders and selling owners Pat and Sue Morton to ensure a true legacy of independence and cement the team right at the very heart of the business

The awards were hosted by Sunday Times Beer Columnist and acclaimed author and broadcaster Pete Brown, who said of the award "the judging panel were unanimous in their praise for Abbeydale who this year were trailblazers in the UK as the first employee-owned brewery, building a future for this much-loved brewery whilst giving back to the team who built it."

The SIBA Business Awards aim to highlight the UK's very best brewing businesses, pubs and retailers of independent beer, in an annual celebration known as the "Oscars of the beer industry" and judged by a panel of industry experts.

The award was collected on behalf of the brewery by Christie McIntosh and Finlay MacDonald, who sit on the new Board of Trustees as Employee Representatives, plus their colleagues and Co-Owners Laura Rangeley and Lily Pickles. Alongside the Employee Ownership Trust, the award recognised the company's long-standing commitment to training, education and emphasis on listening to the employee voice, an ethos which the business has held throughout its existence and has resulted in a loyal and enthusiastic workforce.

McIntosh, who is also a brewer and the Quality Manager at Abbeydale Brewery, said of the EOT; "There are some major perks and holistic benefits which could come with our new status - but we all know we have to put the work in to get there, which is a great motivator. I feel like I can speak for everyone when I say it doesn't automatically make us the best company in the industry to work for – to become that is now entirely down to us. Thank you to Pat and Sue for their leadership and their trust in our team – this award is for them."

Precious brews from Neepsend's Paradise Garage meadery

I've tried mead on and off for many years - I recall my first time was while watching the extended Lord of the Rings trilogy in 2002, and mostly associating it with National Trust gift shops. Later, I discovered better meads – from the various honey types used by UK and German brewers, to those enhanced with fruit or spices.

When visiting the Crow Inn in February 2024, I spotted a small chalkboard advertising local mead. I gave it a try – it was called Salvation

and billed as a traditional mead. It was light and

fresh-tasting, and when I enquired about it, I was told the brewer had a taproom in the middle of its soft launch.

Tim Young was an English teacher overseas, teaching in Vietnam when the pandemic hit in 2020. While unable to teach, he began brewing mead. On his return. Tim – originally from Essex - chose Sheffield as his new home. Still homebrewing at the time, he decided in late 2023 to give full-time brewing a go.

Paradise Garage, his meadery, is named after a long-closed nightclub in New York - and each of the meads follows suit. Salvation is Tim's first and only 'classic' mead, with the others becoming increasingly adventurous: Roxy, with blackcurrant and peppercorn; Funhouse, featuring chilli, apricot and hibiscus; and AM/PM, the latest addition, made with plum and Lapsang Souchong tea.



Paradise Garage mead can always be found at the taproom in Merchant's Court (43 Mowbray St), open Fri 6-10pm and Sat 2-7pm. In keeping with the musical theme, there's even a record player on hand.

It's also available by the glass at various Sheffield venues (most commonly the Old Shoe), and Paradise Garage had a stand at the recent Indie Beer Feast – so keep an eye on the website.

BREWERY BITS

New from **Drone Valley** brewery for the spring is First Gold IPA. Pioneer hops lay the foundation in this recipe providing the bitterness then at the end of the boil First Gold hops are added bringing delicate notes of marmalade. Finally the beer is dry hopped with Mosaic, providing a tropical aroma.

The April cask seasonal in Thornbridge Brewery's Year of Beer was Lumford. a session strength new world pale ale brewed with a blend of hops from the US and New Zealand, Also April saw a showcase event at the Sheffield Tap where the latest Burton Union brewed beer was launched - a West Coast IPA in collaboration with Burning Sky Brewery.

Welbeck Abbey brewery have brewed a special charity beer to raised funds for Rhubarb Farm that provides horticultural therapy. The beer is **Raising the** Dough and is a session IPA brewed with bread.

Eyam Brewery have bottled a fresh batch of Imperial Black Death, the stronger version of their regular vanilla stout. Bottles can be ordered online (collect from the brewery or have couriered to you at home) or selected local bottle shops will also have stock.

PUBLIC TRANSPORT

Some changes in the Peak District part of our branch area already with Hulleys of Baslow going out of business. however the good news is all the routes continue to run with the service provided by new operators. The 271/272 Sheffield to Castleton has High Peak buses whilst the 173 Bakewell to Castleton along with the Monday to Saturday service on the 257 Sheffield to Bakewell via Bamford is in the hands of Andrews of Tideswell. The Summer Sunday service on route 257 is being provided by South Pennine Community Transport. Unrelated to the Hullevs situation. Bus 218 from Sheffield to Bakewell via Totley, which is operated by TM Travel, has now moved to the summer schedule with an improved Sunday frequency. Timetables at derbys-

Service changes in South Yorkshire and Chesterfield take place from 27 April. The 95a and 95b Walkley to Crystal Peaks are cut back to just run Walklev to Sheffield Interchange and the 75a Jordanthorpe to Fox Hill is cut back to Shiregreen. New service X11 is introduced providing a fast link between Sheffield, Waverley, Kimberworth and Maltby with many journeys extended to Doncaster, A

number of other routes have timetable changes. Details are available at travelsouthyorkshire.com.

24 May sees the return of Stagecoach's Peak Sightseer open top tour buses running from Chatsworth House to Bakewell (Red Route) and Castleton (Blue route). A couple of feeder trips are also available from Meadowhead. Woodseats, Millhouses and Totley. A ticket costs £12 for adults and £7 for concessions with a group deal available for up to five people travelling together for £30. Details at stagecoachbus.com.

> Stagecoach's Chesterfield depot has almost completed the introduction of brand new electric buses with a fleet of 18 single deckers and 39 double deckers.

As well as being guieter and having better acceleration than the diesel buses they replace they also feature USB phone charging sockets, next stop announcements and air conditioning.In Sheffield look out for these buses on routes 42/43/44, 50/50a (Sheffield to Chesterfield) and X17 (Barnsley to Wirksworth) along with the Sunday service on route 65 (Meadowhall to Buxton).

NI AND RATES INCREASES **WILL CLOSE MORE PUBS**

CAMRA warns of more shuttered pubs as double whammy of tax changes come into force

The consumer group fears that more pubs will close their doors because of the extra costs of National Insurance rises and an increase in business rates bills in England coming into force this week.

CAMRA is warning that rates of pub business closures and conversions could be on the up this year as licensees face extra costs from the increase in Employer National Insurance contributions which begin on Thursday 6 April.

Pubs in England will also see an increase in the cost of their business rates bills this week, as business rates relief provided by the Government is reduced from 75% to 40% as of 1 April. Some pubs in Scotland and Wales will also receive 40% relief on business rates bills. CAMRA is calling on governments in all nations of the UK to introduce new. fairer business rates systems that are fairer to pubs.

CAMRA's pub data shows that in 2024, 1.062 pub businesses across Great Britain were no longer operating, with buildings standing empty. A further 210 pub buildings have been converted into other uses like shops or housing.

In the first three months of 2025, 303 pub businesses across England, Scotland and Wales closed – whilst a further 46 pubs have been converted into other uses.



CAMRA Chairman Ash Corbett-Collins said:

"Hundreds of pubs have already stopped trading this year. How many more need to shut before the Government takes notice? With big increases in costs from higher National Insurance contributions starting this week, and hikes in business rates bills for pubs in England too, it's important for customers to remember that price hikes at the bar are the fault of the Government, not hardworking publicans.

"Pubgoers are calling on the Chancellor to look closely at the rate of pub closures between now and the Budget in the Autumn, to think again on the **Employer National Insurance** hike for pubs and to cut rates of VAT and duty charged on beer and cider served in pubs.

"Without action from governments in all four nations, we risk losing more pubs which are a vital part of our social fabric and are at the heart of community life up and down the UK."

HERITAGE REVIVAL FUND

Funding to protect heritage pubs needs to be matched by money to save community locals - CAMRA

Commenting on the launch of a new UK Government Heritage Revival Fund today, Chair of CAM-RA's Pub Heritage Group Paul Ainsworth said:

"CAMRA warmly welcomes this new fund which will help communities bid for funding to breathe new life into closed, derelict or at-risk heritage pubs. We believe that pubs in nationally important buildings, or with historic interiors. need to be protected both as buildings which tell us about our national story, but also as thriving pubs acting as the beating heart of communities today.

"The Government also need to provide funding to save underthreat locals that aren't classed as heritage pubs. There are more than 200 community-owned pubs in the country, where previously struggling pubs have been taken over and run for the people, by the people.

"But those looking to take over their local as a community owned pub if it is under threat of closure or conversion need to be able to access advice, support and funding to make sure bids are successful, securing the pub at the heart of community life for decades to come. Since the Community Ownership Fund closed last year, no such funding has been available. The Government should urgently create a new funding stream so that communities can save their local pub."

SHEFFIELD BEER **CENSUS**

SAT 31 MAY

Each year, we encourage as many CAMRA members as possible to head out across Sheffield and help survey the city's pubs - recording which cask ales are available, and where possible, the prices being charged.

While there's definitely a fun side to it - like seeing how many different beers are available in one day and proudly declaring Sheffield the Real Ale Capital of Britain – it also serves a serious purpose. The data helps us track changes in choice, availability and pricing over time. It also gives us a good sense of which brands are most commonly found. It's always great to see local independent brewers like Abbeydale and Bradfield holding their own with strong branding and widespread availability, instead of just national names like Coors, Heineken and Greene King.

Previous vears' survey data fed into a wider project led by the University of Sheffield, with respected beer writer Pete Brown producing a report on Sheffield's beer scene. You can download that report via the link on our website.
