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On Saturday 31 May, members of the Sheffield & District branch headed all around the city and its surrounds to complete the Sheffield Beer Census (last one was Feb 2023). The aim is to take a snapshot of the range and cost of real ales and hopefully confirm Sheffield's rightful status as Beer Capital of the UK.

Groups on different routes set off at midday and met up at the Red Deer in the City Centre. From here, those that could still make it. headed out to other greas and pubs which had not yet been surveyed. As during our last two surveys the weather was extremely good.

#### COUNTS

158 nubs surveved

heers surveved

breweries

158 pubs were surveyed (27 more than last time), with a respectable 629 beers recorded. From this data 376 unique beers were identified from 149 different breweries.

We believe these figures maintain Sheffield's claim to be the Beer Capital, offering the widest choice of cask ales.

For the 138 pubs which were surveyed in person (rather than using data available via social media) an average of 4.34 cask ales per pub were available for sale on the day. Only slightly down from 4.6, the last pre-COVID figure.

For the 79 pubs which were surveyed both in Feb 2023 and May 2025 there was a small drop of 1.5% in the number of beers available.

#### **PRICES**

£1.79 cheapest

£4.13 average £6.50 dearest

The average cost of a pint of real ale was £4.13 (up 50p/13.8% compared to Feb 2023). If Wetherspoons and Samuel Smiths are excluded from this data the average cost per pint was £4.44 (up 54p/13.8%). With no beer duty increases since the last survey, prices are up 6% per year which represents an above inflation increase (average inflation being around 4.5% per year over the 2.3 year period). The cheapest beers were Green King's Ruddle's Best and IPA at £1.79 a pint. The dearest was a 5.7% Big Hoppa by Little Critters at £6.50 pint.

#### **BREWERIES**







Again this year local breweries dominated the pumps with Abbeydale having 62 recorded beers, followed by Bradfield and Thornbridge both on 44 beers each.

#### BFFDS







Beer availability wise the top spot this year was Abbeydale's Moonshine available in 28 of the pubs surveyed, with Bradfield Farmer's **Blonde** second in 26 pubs and **Thornbridge's** Jaipur third in 16 pubs. Sharp's Doom Bar. third place for many years, has dropped down to seventh place.

A special thanks to everyone involved in going out to venues and gathering all the data to make this survey possible.

Bessemer in Sheffield City Centre has been closed for a refurbishment and was due to reopen on 18 July.



Jabbarwocky on London Road in Highfield has had a change of ownership with a leaving party held over the weekend of 11/12 July followed by a week of being closed for a bit of a spruce up before relaunching in time for Tramlines festival fringe!

Crown in Totley is celebrating the current management's 10th anniversary on bank holiday Monday 25 August with festivities including live music, food truck, bouncy castle and kids games.

The new management, Dan & Casper, are now in at the White Lion in Great Longstone and the pub is open serving food and drink

Scotsman's Pack in Hathersage hold their annual beer festival on Saturday 9 August. Then later on in the month on the bank holiday weekend the Old Hall Hotel in Hope hold one of their regular Hope Valley Beer & Cider festivals.

The Hathersage gala took place over a week at the beginning of July. This involves scarecrows being displayed around the village, numerous events and finally on the Saturday a carnival parade through the village and stalls on the football field, Millstone, located in the hills above the village near Surprise Corner got involved too and did appear down in the village at events with a cask of Stancill Stainless!

**Anglers Rest** in Bamford has introduced Friday ABC - Anglers Beer Club. This offers 20% off drinks between 4pm and 6pm each Friday. Meanwhile there have been some changes on the food side of things for the summer with a new country tapas menu introduced whilst the traditional roasts continue to be available on Sundays. Pizzas are available for the quiz night on Wednesdays until 9pm.

**PUB OF THE MONTH** August 2025



The Harlequin, a pub with a history dating back to 1845, is located on Nursery Street in Sheffield, in the Kelham Island area of our branch.

The pub has a large open-plan interior with a central bar, and seating across two levels. Historically, it was known as the Manchester Railway Hotel before, and in 2006 was renamed The Harlequin after a now-demolished Ward's pub around the corner.

After closing in early 2024 it reopened in late July the same year under the ownership of Chris Bamford and Kate Major, who also run

The Rutland Arms and The Crow Inn in Sheffield. A high quality renovation was completed prior to the reopening, which included interior and exterior updates, including a new green and red frontage to match the Harlequin character on the signage. The interior decor incorporates photos of Sheffield and the pub's history. A brand new addition for summer 2025 is a pair of long benches on the pavement to the front of the pub, so with its rear courtyard the pub now offers two external seating areas. There is an upstairs room which can be used for private events.

The beer selection under the new management includes seven cask beers and three cask ciders, in addition to 12 kea lines and two keg ciders. The cask ale range typically features Kirkstall Bitter alongside a varied range of guests – Kernel, North Riding, Torrside and Big Trip are regularly seen. There is also a huge range of spirits, local mead, and a fridge full of cans and bottles of craft beer and cider.

There are regular live music nights which you can find advertised on the pub's social media. and a quiz every Wednesday night at 8.30pm.

Shortly after reopening the Harlequin introduced food at lunchtimes and evenings. There is a lunch menu of sandwiches, an all day menu including chip butties, burgers, fish and chips and vegan curries, and often specials available.

We are presenting Ethan, Lizzie, Chris, Oly, Isra and Theo with their award on 12 August at 8pm – join us there for a beer or two!

In addition to its historical and technical significance. the collaboration supports a vital cause. Garrett Oliver founded The MJF, a non-profit organisation that funds technical education and career advancement for people of colour in the brewing and distilling industries. For every

pint and can of this beer sold. 10 pence will be donated to the foundation

"We were incredibly excited to brew with Garrett using the Union." said Simon Webster. Co-Founder and CEO of Thornbridge Brewery, "To combine this brewing milestone with the opportunity to support such an important cause makes it all the more meaninaful."

Garrett Oliver continued .... "I'm 36 years into my brewing career, and yet this still counts as one of the most personally significant beers I've had the opportunity to brew. My journey into brewing started with British cask beers at the pub, and to brew on this singular and wondrous beast is a great privilege."

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# **ABBEYDALE BREWERY**

August is our birthday month! We turn 29 this year – it's a privilege to have been here doing what we do for almost three whole decades and we're so excited for what the future holds in our new chapter of being 100% employee owned. Thank you for joining us on this journey!

Anyway, enough of the emotional sentiments, here's what we've got coming up this month. Live, Laugh, Loch Lomond (4.2%) is the return leg of our collaboration with Scott, previously part of our brewteam and now at, as the beer name suggests. Loch Lomond Brewery! A light biscuity base meets uniquely flavourful Krush hops to create a fruity little number with a luscious impact!

From the imaginarium of Doctor Morton we have the return of **Proper Gander** (4.1%). Get up really close and get a long, careful look at this Chinook and Pacific Gem hopped pale. Another returning beer to our line up is segsonal special Harvested, a 4.1% pale with Galaxy hops. Expect a fruity beer with refreshing tropical character alongside a clean, grapefruit bitterness and a subtle spiciness in the finish.

And on the Brewers Emporium side of things look out for *Hazelnut Frappé Stout* (5.2%) from our Salvation series, in collaboration with Castleton Coffee Co. Smooth and silky, with a bold coffee character balanced by sweet, nutty overtones and notes of chocolate and vanilla. And finally we have vibrant, juicy pale ale **Trailblazer** (4.4%) riding into town, with Amarillo, Simcoe and Galaxy hops.

**Eyam** Brewery's second open day of this year is in the diary for Saturday 26 July, from 1pm to 7:30pm. This sees a bar open in the brewery serving a range of their beer on both cask and keg with bottles also available to buy to take home. On the same weekend, not in our area but a short train ride away. The brewery is in South Kirkby, walkable from Moorthorpe railway station (Sheffield to Leeds/York via Rotherham train).


A recent seasonal brew from **Bradfield** Brewery is Farmers Blueberry Ale, a fruity little number at a sessionable 4.4% ABV.

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#### **NATIONAL BREWERIANA AUCTION**

CAMRA's 39th National Breweriana Auction: Saturday 25th October 2025

Have you ever fancied owning a slice of brewing history? Then this Auction is just the thing for you. Run by the Campaign for Real Ale, the National Breweriana Auction returns to Burton on Trent's Town Hall on Saturday 25th October. It will have circa 150 interesting auction lots; everything from mirrors to trays; advertising signs, water jugs, flagons, bottles, books and pump clips as well as a few more unusual items. Plus there will be a number of stands selling brewery memorabilia adding to the atmosphere in this wonderful Victorian venue.

There are all sorts of items from all over the country to decorate your home. What about a Guinness clock or a delightful plate from Lincolnshire's Batemans Brewery. The plate was issued to their employees after the brewery was saved from closure in 1987 when the sister and brother of George Bateman wanted to sell. One of the key components to saving the Brewery was their XXXB winning CAMRA's Champion Beer of Britain, resulting in full order books.

As always, there are a number of advertising display cards including two from London's Barclay Perkins (set up in 1616 and merged with Courage in 1955) and one from the less known Simpson's of Baldock. Hertfordshire. The brewery was founded in the 1730s and renamed Simpsons in 1853 when it was bought by Joseph & Thomas George Simpson. To avoid death duties, the business was sold to Greene King with 130 pubs in 1954 for £525,000 and closed in 1965.

Another item from Barclay Perkins is a corked bottle of Imperial Russian Stout, probably 70 years old. Other items from past London brewing giants are two Toby jugs from Charringtons, who were famous for its Toby Jua logo. They were founded in 1770, merging with Bass, Mitchell & Butler, to form Bass Charringtons in 1967, which made them the largest brewery in the

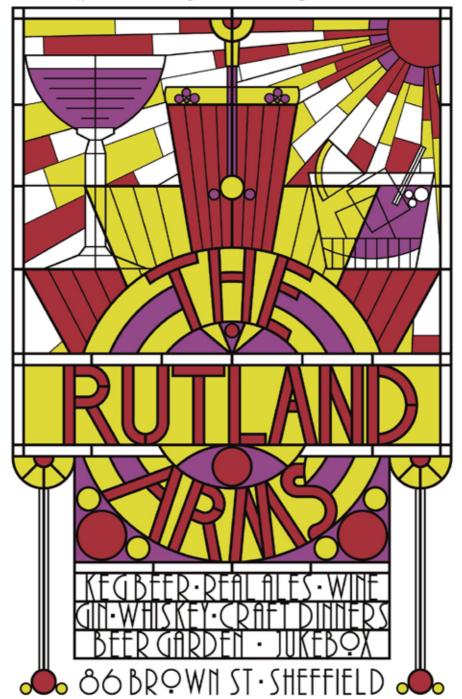
UK at that time. The London brewery was closed and brewing moved to the Midlands in 1975.

Two items, you can either use or more likely display, are travs from Wadworth of Devizes (founded in 1875) and still in family hands) and the less known Tennants. This is not the better known Scottish Tennents Brewery but a brewery established by two brothers in 1840 in Sheffield. They were acquired by Whitbread in 1961 with 700 tied houses becoming Whitbread East Pennines but closed in 1993.

These are just a few of the items on sale, each with a history to tell. You don't have to be an expert to attend the National Breweriana Auction. The Auction is great fun to take part in (or even just to watch) and it's an opportunity to get some great bargains plus many of the items on sale can appreciate in value. And, of course, like any CAMRA event, there is some good beer on sale all day (from a local brewery).

Burton on Trent is less than an hour by train from Shefield and the Town Hall is just a short walk from the railway station. The event starts at 10.30am with the opportunity to view the lots and browse the breweriana stands that will also be there. Biddina starts at noon and is normally finished by 3pm, giving a chance to have a final perusal of the stands before visiting some of Burton's iconic pubs and heading home

**SKEGNESS 80S WEEKEN** 

Having been on the 70s weekend at Butlins last year, we moved a decade on this time.

Gordon and I decided we'd chill on the train, with a few cans of course. So, after setting off at 07:23 from Sheffield, we got down to the task. The journey was nice and smooth, just a short 15 minute change at Grantham. Our friend drove, so arrived at camp earlier, where we had to aueue. and only two staff later in the day.



On exiting the station in the town centre, you have a short crossing to the **Lumley**, it only had two ales, but they were OK. I had both, a Batemans XB Bitter of 3.7%, and the Theakstons Hairy Bikers Bitter at 4.2%. Across the road is the **Red Lion**. Skeaness's Wethersoons. A quick pint of standard cider, before our real goal of the Crafty Local Ale House five minutes walk away.



We ended up visiting this micropub three times. and what a gem. The building was originally a quest house in 1929, but then underwent changes of use as a college facility, blind institute and a dental practice, among others. There's a nice outside, perfect for the weather we had. Inside is a small room with the bar, and a larger room to the right for entertainment.

There was three cask, 4-5 box ciders and a few kea. Talking to the owner, he said later this vear onwards will see further improvements. My choices over the visits were Salopian The Thirteenth Hat NZ pale, 3.9%. Milestone Son of a Beach IPA of 4.5% and Celtic Marches Tutti Frutti cider, only 3.4%, but plenty of flavour. My friends chose cider as one likes it and the other requires GF drinks

Although we wanted to see the music at the camp, we were thwarted as it was far busier than last year and most arenas were bursting. We managed to get room to see Kim Wilde, Marty's daughter, after 15 minutes of Black Lace (and no, I didn't do the actions to "I Am the Music Man" and "Agadoo"). She put on a fantastic show of around 70 minutes covering all the hits.

We covered Ingoldmells on Saturday, just drinking standard keg as real ale only seems to be on in one pub, the Countryman, and we were informed their brewer has left to become head



brewer at the recently revived Jennings. We then returned to Skegness on Sunday and visited the **Three Monkeys** on the front, just one ale in Batemans *XB*, a decent pint for £3.50. Then it was back to the Crafty, before Gordon and I went in the **Red Lion** for a drink. We sat in the outdoor area where I sampled a Little Valley *Tod's Blonde*, an IPA of 5%.

Back to camp and more keg. A quieter night just chatting before retiring at a reasonable 00:00 for bed. Showered, breakfast and out. We had a quick one before the train. Five carriages to Grantham, then someone decided only two on to Nottingham and Sheffield, not the best logistics planner?

Next year we plan on either a 60s, or soul weekend.
We're pretty sure we'll be there though, and hopefully more people will have followed the Crafty's idea and opened a micropub.

I recently returned from Belgium after a few days on a trip which involved beer, trains and trams. We stayed in the home of Belgian rail, Mechelan: my visit including several visits to mostly volunteer-run, tram/train rides/museums.



Steam Train Maldegem-Eeklo is a heritage railway based at the former National Rail station of Maldegem. This houses the largest number of operational diesel and steam locomotives in Flanders. All enjoyed the trip on a narrow gauge line in old open wagons pulled by one of their diesel locomotives.

The **Dendermonde-Puurs Steam Railway** (a standard gauge heritage service) took us on a 45 minute return journey from Puurs (Signal Box) to Baasrode-Noord station. The track winds through the Scheldeland through the provinces of Antwerp and East Flanders. On board was waiter service: Dilewyns Vicaris Tripel 8.5% and the house train beer, Brouwkeet Stomerke 6%, were sampled.





Rail Rebecq Rognon (RRR or Petit Train Du Bonheur - The Small Train of Happiness) explores the old SNCB Lines 115 and 123 on a 4 km line crossing the Rebecquoise countryside along the Senne and the Vallée des Oiseaux.



The diesel loco took us on a return ride on the narrow gauge line between Rebeca and Rognon. Floreffe Triple 8% was available at the station café.

Our major tram ride was Tram 44 from Montgomery Metro Station (Brussels). This starts underground before emerging onto Avenue de Tervuren, It then rumbles past Stoclet House and the tram museum before plunging into the forest. The journey ends some 20 minutes later at the 19th-century tram station in Tervuren, a royal suburb of Brussels within the once great ancient Sonian Forest. The Tram Museum (opened 1976) housed in the 1897 tram depot has a vast collection of 130 vehicles including a 1869 horse-drawn tram.

TramSite Schepdaal (Dilbeek) is the only remaining local (or vicinal) tramway depot in Belgium, the line closing in 1970. This depot served the first tramway in Flemish Brabant: Brussels to Ninove (1888). The oldest buildings at Schepdaal date from then. The station café provided local beer, Angerik Dilleke 5.1%.

We also visited **Duvel Depot** in Breendonk, the tap of the family-controlled Duvel

Moortgat brewery (1871), and the Batteliek microbrewery on the outskirts of Mechelen. The latter is an old red brick church, now a brewery, bar and eatery under the auspices of Het Anker. The tasting flight was chosen: Baobab Tripel 8.8%. Ipapotamus 7.7% and Derkal 8.3%. The Het Anchor Brouwerij tap (Mechelen) also provided a flight: Gouden Carolus Hopsinjoor 8.0%, Gouden Carolus Whisky Infused 11.7% and a Batteliek Bieren.













Several other bars were visited - recommended in Mechelen are Beer Central, Hanekeef, Het Maanlicht, Kuub and Moemoe. Het Maanlicht provided one of the most interesting beers of the trip: De Blauwe Kuip Burton 5.2% - an (almost) British bitter served in a half-pint 'jua'. Other recommendations include: De Cuytegemhoeve beer cafe (Puurs-Sint-Amands) and Eetcafe D'Akte (Lennik).



Strangest sight of the trip was undoubtably an open-air tango dancing class in the Veermarkt in Mechelen – only in Belgium ... the next trip is planned for September.

The sun was out, and even at 10:30 it was hovering around 21°. I arrived at the Sheffield Tap with time to spare for a pint before the 11:37 train. The selection as ever was good, so I went for a new one to me Pentrich's Hollywood Forever, a nice APA of 4.5% to start the day. Nearing 11:25. I made my way to the departure board, and found it not working. On speaking to a member of staff. I found it was Platform 2.

Through the main doors we went to pop in for a drink at the Mallard. This is a fantastic little bar has a legendary status with four cask ales from varying regions. My tipple of choice was Welbeck's Elder Maria, a pale of only 3.9% but packed with flavour, there was also Badger and Great Divide on the bar. Graham and Paul opted for the darker bitter on offer.

PLATFORM 3

A short hop through the car park and we were at the Station Hotel, a nice decorated pub with two wickets. One being Glamorgan Ffresh EPA, a beer I had never seen before. but throughly enjoyed in the nice beer aarden outside. A short walk downhill saw us enter town and the very strangely named Wetherspoons - the Liquorice Gardens. The choice was the usual 4-6 cask. I went for the Titanic Raspberry Pale, a weighty 4.7%.



On most of our trips, we have a little issue with Google Maps. This time is was finding the Millhouse. The sat nay took us in a circle again. before a lady told us it was way down the road the other way. Some 15 minutes later, we arrived at a smart outside and inside pub with 3 cask. You don't see Everards much around Sheffield, so I gave the Tiger – Bitter, 4.2% a punt. I'm glad I did, as it was a nice biscuity, malty ale.



Awaiting to board, I thought this may be a solo reconnaissance trip, but with five minutes to spare Graham and Paul turned up to join me. The 30 minute journey on a relatively quiet train passed quickly, and before we knew it we were alighting at Worksop.



Worksop Rugby Club was indicated as being round the corner, and this time the map worked, which was handy as a deluge was threatening. Luckily we missed it both arriving and leaving, thus ensuring dry shirts and shorts for the trip home. This bar advertises two changing ales on Worksop's CAMRA website, but needs changing.

We arrived after the walk through a private housing estate, to find no real ale. There was an explanation on enquiring of "we had some yesterday," but that was of little use for us. Graham and Paul had bottled ale, while I went for a reasonable pint of Belhaven 80 Shilling, not bad to say it was keg. If visiting,

I would give them a ring to check on cask beer availability.

Hunger was creeping in and we'd spotted a chippy on the way, so we popped in. I had a fishcake, and again the contentious issue was that it was really a rissole, but we weren't in Yorkshire, so I suppose you have to cut them some slack. So food consumed we took the lengthy road back to the station.

A walk to town again, and a slight uphill to the station saw us get a return train fairly promptly. We had intended to hop off at Kiveton Park for the Tap, but we'd had a long day and decided to finish in the Sheffield Tap and in no

time we made our farewells.

Despite it only being the three of us, we had a nice tour, and a laugh. At least next time, we know the route, and could possibly add one or two more.


